About our school

Provident Charter School in Pittsburgh, PA is a publicly funded school designed to address the needs of students with language-based learning differences such as dyslexia. Our students are bright yet struggle with topics such as reading, writing and sequencing. Located on the city's North Shore the school just completed its 5th year. Provident serves a little over 300 students and these students come from over 42 different districts in the surrounding Pittsburgh area.

Teaching at PCS

Each specials class reaches capacity with between 12-15 students. The Music Instructor must be interested in approaching learning with creativity and will seek out and leverage opportunities for students to learn in both traditional and non-traditional ways. In addition to Music, students at PCS participate in traditional Art, 3D Design, Tae Kwon Do, and Physical Education.

Job Goals

- Develop creative lesson plans based on PA standards for Music instruction that truly engage students.
- Support music recess "clubs" for students who have an interest and/or talent in music.
- Collaborate with other teachers, professional staff, and administrators to address instructional and/or classroom issues.
- Lead the planning and performance of some type of annual performance/production.
- Respond to a wide range of inquiries from parents or guardians regarding instruction, learning and student progress.

Results Matter:

On average, students enrolled at Provident Charter School typically have reading scores that lag one year behind their grade level and just over one year behind their grade level in math. However, students who have been with Provident for longer than one year improved, on average, two grade levels in Reading and nearly three grade levels in Math.*

*Reading scores are based on Woodcock Reading Mastery. Math scores are based on Wide Range Achievement Test.

School Curriculum Structured For Success:

- Provident Charter School's academic curriculum follows the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Common Core Standard's – with instruction using Orton-Gillingham-based methodologies.
- Educators also leverage assistive technology to provide personalized accommodations to students delivering a unique, one-to-one learning opportunity.
- Teachers are trained to provide continuous, structured practice and immediate corrective feedback to develop automatic recognition skills among students.
- 6:1 student-to-faculty ratio
- Special classes, including Makerspace and Tae Kwon Do, round out the school's robust educational strategies.
- There is typically no homework for elementary students.
- Receive Wilson Reading System[®] instruction daily.



About Our Teachers:

You and your child expect a lot from their teachers. We expect a lot from ourselves.

- All Provident English Language Arts teachers have or will have completed a 65-hour practicum and are Wilson[®] Dyslexia Practitioners.
- All Math teachers have completed a 30-hour multi-sensory mathematics course through the Atlantic Seaboard Dyslexia Education Center.

Provident Charter School uses a performance pay model for both teachers and staff – helping to further ensure outcomes are rooted in student success and achievement in each grade. This is a unique approach in public education. Teachers are looped in two-year cycles to provide students and educators with fresh knowledge and insight at the class and individual level.

Defining Dyslexia:

Dyslexia is a language-based disability and is the technical term for when the brain processes language in a non-traditional manner. Dyslexia may be characterized by difficulty with:

 Word recognition, decoding, recognizing letters, matching letters to sounds and blending sounds into speech.

- Pronouncing or using the right words.
- Learning the alphabet, numbers and new vocabulary.
- Mastering the rules of spelling.
- Handwriting or gripping a pencil.
- Reversing similarly shaped letters or moving letters around within a word.
- Following a sequence of directions.
- Word problems in math.
- Rhyming.



Students with dyslexia need to master the same basic knowledge about language and its relationship to our writing system. However, because of their dyslexia, they need more help sorting, recognizing, and organizing the raw materials of language for thinking and use, and must be taught directly and systematically.

Subsequently, the Orton-Gillingham Approach used at Provident Charter School focuses on the learning needs of the individual student through small group instruction.
